Spotlight on: New Massachusetts Farm Energy Program Funding

Program. "Our number one mission is to help commercial agriculture in Massachusetts."

New funding from the United States Department of Agriculture will support the work of the MFEP. The USDA has awarded a \$33,000 Rural Business Development Grant to MFEP, which will be used to provide information, funding assistance, and technical assistance to farms that wish to improve their energy efficiency and reduce operating costs.

The funding was announced by MDAR Commissioner John Lebeaux on January 6 at Smith's Country Cheese in Winchendon. In 2016, Smith's installed a solar thermal array with funding from the the USDA's REAP and NRCS programs, MDAR's Agricultural Energy Grant Program, and the Massachusetts Clean Energy Center. This solar thermal array helps the farm save \$3,368 in energy costs annually, and reduces energy use by 1,300 gallons of oil each year.

Smith's was recently purchased by Allie and Jake Catlin from longtime original owner Dave Smith, an early adopter of many sustainable practices. The cheese making operation produces award-winning cheeses of all varieties, and the farm features many energy producing and saving technologies, including a photovoltaic system, inverters to convert generated DC current into AC current, and the latest technology in power management and monitoring.
